Application for: African Studies Program Student Awards and Tejumola Olaniyan International Student Travel Award

Project Proposal

I am applying for these awards to defray the cost of traveling to Nigeria for fieldwork (archival research and oral history) for my dissertation. My project examines Nigerian women's digitally-mediated sexual discourses to understand (i) the affordances of networked digital media as alternative spaces for enabling women's sexual conversations which are limited in conventional public spaces (ii) how these discourses engage and critique dominant/institutional sexual discourses (iii) women's own rhetorical construction of sexual pleasure and agency. From an African-feminist rhetorical perspective, I am analyzing (i) digital texts on Nigerian women and sex, which are publicly available on digital platforms; and (ii) primary data I am collecting from online surveys, online focus groups and online in-depth interviews with content creators.

The proposed fieldwork includes archival research and oral history collections. I will visit two key Archives: National Archives Ibadan and the Lagos State Archive. I will also be visiting the Archives section of the Obafemi Awolowo University Hezekiah Oluwasanmi Library in Ife. I will be weaving together the sexual narratives and their rhetorical work about Nigerian women from historical documents on sex work in colonial Nigeria, government policies and regulations, and newspapers. The fieldwork will fill in the gap created by my online research methods by including the historical perspectives on Nigerian women and sex as women's sexual discourses are better understood within the socio-historical contexts shaping these discourses and how they impact contemporary women's sexual knowledge, beliefs and practices. Also, academic conversations on the historical contexts/perspectives on Nigerian women and sexual pleasure and agency is limited. The fieldwork will provide a richer and fuller understanding in articulating Nigerian women's sexual rhetoric online. Also gathering oral histories from older women about the sexual beliefs and norms in their times will help me understand the social groups women created as alternative spaces for sexual conversations before the prevalence of digital media. This will highlight the prevalent sexual conventions and norms and how these have changed over time. This is also important because the voices and views of certain women without access to digital technologies will be excluded if I use online research methods only.

Undertaking this study contributes to understanding how sexual dialogues shape what we know about Nigerian women's sexual experiences as they (de)construct knowledge and disrupt dominant discourses that limit their possibilities of sexual agency and pleasure. It also

contributes to understanding the complexity of women's sexual rhetorics in global and digital contexts, particularly from an African-feminist rhetorical perspective. I articulate rhetorical dialoguing as an analytical and theoretical framework for accounting for Nigerian women's sexual discourses and rhetorical strategies for engaging sex, highlighting the contexts and functions of such dialogue as rhetorically significant. I argue that their sexual discourses are rhetorically significant because they reveal the socio-cultural contexts that they navigate their sexual desires, pleasure and agency; the dominant sexual discourses that they engage and critique. Through their counter sexual narratives, they demonstrate that they do not necessarily conform to sexual norms, articulate the possibility and evidence of sexual pleasure and agency while redefining what these mean for a Nigerian woman.

My project makes a rhetorical intervention which can also be extended to issues characterized by silence or dominant views that exclude the experiences of those historically marginalized and oppressed. In particular, my work is in dialogue with other theorists and theories that acknowledge rhetorical practices that foster honoring differences and a more equitable society. Two of such are Ratcliffe's Rhetorical Listening and Sonja and Griffin's Invitational Rhetoric. Building on theorizing rhetoric as invitation and rhetorical listening sets the stage for dialoguing as a rhetorical practice that seeks to trouble dominant and privileged ways of knowing, lessen the hierarchical relations between online users, and allow for multiple viewpoints towards understanding an issue and the people experiencing them, and not necessarily towards truth.
